RETURN TO SCHOOL

It is not unusual for fall to be a busy time of year for school districts. This year was unique due to COVID-19 and the New York State mandates and procedures that were put into place to ensure the safety and well-being of our students and staff.

Superintendent Bruno welcomed teachers and staff back to campus in early September. Professional development sessions provided training focused on health and safety, instructional models and remote learning technology. Staff

used this time to prepare and adjust lesson plans, adapt to new mandates/policies and incorporate technology into everyday instruction.

Our technology department worked continuously to make devices ready for distribution to students, teach new platforms and man the hotlines to ensure students, staff and families had the assistance they needed.

After six months of empty buildings and quiet halls, students and staff returned to

campus to begin the 2020-21 academic year on September 10 and 11. We opened our doors with a hybrid learning model, where the majority of students returned to campus two days a week with three days of remote learning. Our English Language Learners and some special education students are on campus four days a week. Under 30 percent of our students chose to begin the year learning remotely.

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FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Brockport community,

As I write this column, we are beginning our sixth full week of instruction. During the return to school planning over the summer, some did not think we would be in school this long. I am proud that not only have we made it this far, but we have also been able to increase student opportunities by offering athletics and clubs.

Our elementary, middle and high school students have, in exemplary fashion, followed the health and safety protocols outlined for them. Additionally, families and staff have stepped up to help ensure the success of our students. I am extremely proud of our students, families, teachers, administrators and support staff. Everyone has worked hard to stay safe and adjust to our new policies, procedures and ways of learning. Students and staff are happy to be back, and there is a genuine positive atmosphere in our schools.

Creating our reopening plan was a major challenge. Our entire staff had to create procedures in every area of our district. Implementing the plan presented even more obstacles. Guidance from the Department of Health and the State Education Department has evolved, and our plan has evolved with it. With each decision, we have erred on the side of health and safety. I appreciate everyone's dedication, patience and support throughout the changes.

After safety, the most crucial element of our educational organization is learning. Our instructional staff has had to rewrite curriculum, engage in professional development, provide feedback on the reopening plan and creatively plan for new instructional models. Like the students, our teachers have had to relearn, adapt and restructure their thinking about school. I am exceedingly impressed with their efforts. As we enter November, we are focused on evaluating and improving our models to ensure we maximize learning for all cohort groups.

Our administrators created buildingspecific procedures to maintain health and safety. There are procedures on arrival/dismissal, mask breaks, safety drills, passing time, disinfecting, attendance, faculty meetings and student mental health needs. They spent the first two weeks ironing out any issues that surfaced. Our administrators are terrific problemsolvers and have done an excellent job throughout our reopening.

Along with these new procedures and learning models, it is important to note that we remain focused on caring for our students as if they were our own. You will notice in the picture, I am holding a student's hand. It was the first day of school and this young man needed support and assistance getting to his bus. I took care of him the way I would want my own children cared for. Please know


that while we weren't wearing gloves, we made certain our hands were sanitized.

As we look to the upcoming months, I strongly urge everyone to continue following safety protocols and guidelines, both in and outside of school. The more we adhere to these protocols in our everyday lives, the greater the chance we can continue to provide these opportunities for our students.

International Walk to School Day

Since 1997, communities have been coming together for Walk to School Day. The Brockport Walk to School Committee and the Brockport Central School District have been participating in this event since 2005.

Due to the coronavirus pandemic, the event looked a bit different this year. While October 7, 2020 was the official Walk to School Day, this year families walked throughout the week of October 5-9, 2020. Given the social distancing guidelines and heightened safety mandates, the district did not have greeters or food/ water stations on campus but did celebrate with their students. The week-long event promoted healthy habits and encouraged all students, on campus or at home, to be active.





Keeping our schools safe

We all have a role to play in keeping our schools safe and preventing the spread of COVID-19. While on campus or on a bus, Brockport students, staff, families and visitors are required to wear proper face coverings and practice social distancing. Here is a look at how you can help us stay safe and remain open.

- Student daily health screening:
 Brockport students need to complete a home health screening each morning before getting on the bus or arriving to school. Parents/students should complete the screening through the link that is emailed to parents and students in grades 6-12. The emailed link is associated with student accounts and is used to monitor students in each building.
- BCSD visitor/vendor health screening: Any individual who enters a building on campus must complete a health screening prior to arrival. The visitor/vendor health screening can be found on the district website under the "Community" tab.

- Stay home if you are sick: If you have a temperature greater than 100 degrees or have signs of illness, DO NOT come to school. When in doubt, stay home and consult with your personal physician.
- Wear a proper face covering: BCSD requires that proper face coverings be worn on buses and in all school facilities. Wearing a mask helps slow the spread of COVID-19, which helps keep all of us healthy.
- **Social distance:** Stay six feet away from others whenever possible and respect other people's space.
- Wash your hands: Take every opportunity to wash your hands with soap and water, scrubbing for at least 20 seconds and rinsing well. If you cannot wash your hands, please frequently use alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

• Avoid big crowds: Unfortunately, assemblies and field trips are off limits right now. If you need to be in a line or a group of people, try to keep six feet of distance from them. Only two spectators per athlete are allowed to attend a sporting event. Lanyards will be distributed, and attendance will be taken at all schools.

Return to school

Whether in the hybrid model or completely remote, students are adapting to a new way of learning. New technologies are being used within the classroom and at home, lessons are being completed in-person and virtually through SeeSaw and classmates and teachers are connecting for video calls through Microsoft Teams.

While some lessons are completed asynchronously, such as watching pre-recorded video lessons, others utilize new technology for synchronous learning. Sometimes, that includes streaming lessons live to students at home and other times it involves video conferences that





address topics such as social-emotional learning. On Wednesdays, when all students are remote, teachers provide live check-ins with their students.

We understand transitioning to remote learning and navigating the new technology can be challenging. Board of Education reorganization meeting

The Brockport Central School District Board of Education held its annual reorganization meeting on July 7, 2020. During the meeting, newly re-elected board member, David Howlett, took the oath of office to serve a five-year term.

The oath of office was administered to Terry Ann Carbone and Jeffrey Harradine, who were elected to serve as president and vice-president, respectively. Superintendent Sean Bruno, District Treasurer Jill Reichhart and District Clerk Deb Moyer were also sworn in.

BOE meeting schedule:

Regular board meetings are typically held the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 6 p.m. during the school year and 5 p.m. during the summer. In adherence with COVID-19 guidelines and social gathering restrictions, meetings will be held in the Fred Hill School Cafetorium until further notice. Meetings are open to the public. Face coverings are required, and a daily health screening must be completed prior to attending meetings.

This screening can be found at www.bcs1.org, click on "Community" and then "BCSD Daily Health Screening". The green checkmark showing you are cleared to be on campus should be shown upon entering the meeting.

A complete BOE meeting schedule can be found at www.bcs1.org/boe. Any changes will be posted on the website calendar.

Emergency procedure review

The safety and security of students and staff remains a priority at Brockport Central School District. Each year we review our emergency policies and procedures to ensure students, staff and families know how to respond in the event of an emergency.

Automated messaging

The district uses SchoolMessenger, an automated messaging system, to guickly communicate with families via phone and email. In the event of an emergency, such as a lockout or lockdown, calls will be made to all parent/quardian's home, work and cell phone numbers, along with emergency contacts 1-4 listed on the Student Profile Form updated every September (or when there is a change in contact information). The messages will also be sent via email. Additionally, those who have downloaded the Brockport CSD mobile application will be notified via a push notification. If you do not have the mobile app and would like to download it, search for "Brockport Central" in your device's app store.

The district will periodically use the automated messaging system to share other important information such as open house reminders or last-minute event changes. Information classified as "non-emergency" will be sent only to the primary home phone numbers and email addresses on file.

Lockouts and lockdowns

People often use the terms lockout and lockdown interchangeably. At BCSD, a lockout is initiated when there is a potential risk outside the building or district (i.e., an armed person is threatening the community; a suspicious condition, chemical spill or rabid/aggressive animal exists in the area). During a lockout, exterior doors and windows are locked, outside activities are terminated and instruction continues as normal inside the building.

A lockdown is initiated when there is an impending risk to the building or district (i.e., an armed/violent/aggressive person threatening or attacking a school building or the district; an imminent threat that may involve a specific building or the district). In this case, the same protocols would be followed for a lockout, however, classroom doors are locked and instruction is halted.

How parents and guardians can help during emergency situations

- Listen carefully to automated phone calls and messages you receive. Please listen to the entire message, then visit the district's website for more information at www.bcs1.org.
- Don't panic. Just like you, we make your children's safety our main priority. We have solid procedures in place to keep them safe. We practice emergency drills multiple times each year with our students and staff and consistently review our safety procedures.
- Avoid calling your child's school. We will notify you as more information becomes available.
- Don't rush to campus. If there is an actual emergency on our campus where law enforcement or emergency personnel need to respond, it is critical to keep the campus clear so they can quickly resolve the situation.
- Keep your contact information up-to-date. It is important to have a current email address on file, in addition to home, work and cell phone numbers.

PBIS focuses on creating positive school environments

Our Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) teams in Brockport work hard to create fun, age-appropriate activities that review the K-12 universal expectations of being respectful, being responsible and being a learner. Each school incorporates the framework using these strategies to reinforce academic and social behaviors to create positive school environments. This year, the district also stressed the importance of social-emotional learning and included various activities to support students' social and emotional well-being.



Ginther Elementary: Peter Kramer and Mitch Daly

Ginther has continued its tradition of selecting weekly Bee Buck winners. Winners are students who have followed the three B's: Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be a Learner. Teachers and students watch PBIS videos to reinforce building-wide expectations for behavior and learning in school and at home. Our hybrid and remote students can attend check-and-connect sessions with teachers daily to help build a sense of community. Our counselor, Mr. Kramer, developed a virtual counseling classroom for all students with resources focused on behavior, social-emotional learning and a sense of belonging.

Barclay Elementary: *Scott Morrison*

All Barclay classrooms are reading "What Would Danny Do?" which introduces students to the idea that they have the power to choose what to do when confronted with situations and how their choices have meaning. Teachers also hold morning meetings with all students allowing classmates, whether in class or at home, to connect with one another. The school counselor meets with remote teams weekly, and Wednesday mornings are used to focus specifically on social-emotional lessons. The Citizen of the Month program will continue to recognize students who make good choices as classroom citizens!

Hill Elementary: Brandon Broughton

Hill Elementary does a morning check-and-connect with our fully remote and hybrid remote students. Some classes are conducting community circles with both virtual and in-person students. PBIS assemblies are being held virtually this year. Assemblies were held for the fully remote students, as well as the hybrid groups. Hill students also created a hallway display with each student's hand listing their unique and special characteristics.

Oliver Middle School: *Michelle Guerrieri*

Oliver Middle School focused on back-to-school engagement and Oliver Essentials, with respect to mandated guidelines and at-home remote learning. Citizenship and perseverance were highlighted, with an emphasis on resiliency. PBIS activities allowed students to re-engage in school while building new relationships and setting personal academic goals. Classes also participated in Flipgrid activities (some turned into fun competition), and students brainstormed how differently school will look this year and what that would mean for them as learners.

Brockport High School: Michael Pincelli and Jillian Velekkakan

High School students from multiple cohorts have been connecting virtually for supportive check-ins. Sessions have even included an introduction to students' beloved pets! Students have also been practicing "mindful coloring" during their homebase period, contributing to a positive affirmation poster which has been displayed in the hallway to bring positivity into the school.



BHS: Pandemic Publication

"When we look back on our experiences throughout a health crisis lasting longer than any of us could have imagined, what and how will we remember it?"

Last spring, the twelfth grade English Literature and Composition class spent the final weeks of their senior year organizing a publication for the district that offered an outlet for positive expressions to a frightening and frustrating time. The publication is broken into tabs, each using a different platform to share work. From poetry and podcasts to art and interviews, students and staff across the district shared their personal experiences as they lived through the COVID-19 pandemic.

Brockport sports update

The New York State Public Health School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA) moved the sports classified as moderate to high risk, including competitive cheerleading, football and volleyball, to March 1, 2021. Per NYSPHSAA guidelines, two spectators per athlete will be allowed to attend games/events. Attendance will be taken at all venues across Monroe County. National School Bus Safety Week

Held during the third full week of October each year, the National School Bus Safety Week is an active public education program aimed at addressing school bus safety. This year's theme is "Red Lights Mean STOP!" Below are a few safety skills provided by Matthew Schultz, BCSD Director of Transportation.

Safety skills for students

Waiting:

- Walk safely to your bus stop.
- Be on time five minutes before scheduled pick-up time.
- Wait quietly away from the road.
- Don't move toward the bus until the driver signals.

Loading:

- Use the handrail.
- Do not bring large, sharp or breakable items on the bus.
- Don't carry awkward loads use a backpack or book bag to keep items together.
- Sit down immediately and buckle your seatbelt securely.

Riding:

- Do not distract the driver.
- Keep your body inside the bus.
- Do not bother the other students.
- Know how to evacuate your bus.

Unloading:

- Check before you step.
- Move away from the bus right away.
- Go directly home.

Crossing:

- Walk 10 giant steps (10 feet) ahead of the bus until you can see the driver's face
- Wait for the driver's signal.
- Cross to the outside edge of the bus and make sure all traffic is stopped.
- If clear, cross quickly. If not clear, return to the curb.

Tips for motorists

- Be alert and slow down when driving in neighborhoods with school zones.
- Watch for children walking, playing or assembling near bus stops. Children arriving late to the bus may run into the road without looking for traffic.
- Obey NYS school bus laws, as well as the flashing light signal systems on buses.
 - o Flashing yellow lights mean the bus is preparing to stop to load/unload children. Motorists should slow down and prepare to stop.
 - o Flashing red lights and extended stop arms indicate the bus has stopped and children are loading/ unloading. Motorists MUST STOP and wait until the red lights stop flashing and the extended stop arm is withdrawn before proceeding.



Red Ribbon Week

The Red Ribbon Campaign is the oldest and largest drug prevention campaign in the country and is a great way to kick off conversations about drug prevention.

This year's theme was "Be Happy. Be Brave. Be Drug Free." Oliver Middle School and Brockport High School hosted a variety of activities throughout the end of October to raise awareness and take a stand against drugs. Students dressed up for the theme of the day, posters were created and pledges were signed to remain drug free.
